 Note for Question 19: Employees can claim home office expenses if the following conditions are met: They worked from home in 2020 due to the pandemic, or the employer required them to work from home; and They worked > 50% of the time from home for at least 4 consecutive weeks in 2020; and The expenses were used directly in their work during the period. Employees can use the detailed method to claim actual expenses paid for the period that they worked from home. Under this method, employees must: Calculate the size of the work space, Keep supporting documents, and Obtain Form T2200 (or T2200S) from the employer. Alternatively, for 2020 only, employees can use a simplified method (or the "temporary flat rate method") to claim \$2 per day, up to a maximum of 200 days (or \$400 total). Under this method, employees do not have to provide details or obtain Form T2200 from the employer.

 Specified foreign property does <u>not</u> include: Property used or held exclusively in carrying on an active business; Share or indebtedness of a foreign affiliate; and Personal-use property (e.g. Florida cottage used for personal enjoyment).
